Our History is a Treasure: Chapter Eighteen By Jan Otten

The most recent fun history reference that I've pulled up out of the Hobe Sound Treasure Chest is none other than that iconic restaurant, Harry and the Natives, affectionately called, Harry's, situated on the southwest corner of U.S. Highway 1 (aka Federal Highway) and Bridge Road.

One does not pass through, visit, or reside in Hobe Sound and not know about Harry and the Natives. When telling people how to find their way around Hobe Sound, we always start by saying, "Do you know where Harry and the Natives is located?" and from there we give directions!

This remarkable landmark has been a major part of Hobe Sound going back to that most infamous day in history, December 7, 1941. Not the most auspicious day to open a new business, but on that very day "The Cypress Cabins and Restaurant" opened its doors with a café, a motel, and gas pumps, ready to welcome tourists passing through or stopping for a little time in the warm

Some twenty years earlier this small town was being developed by the Olympia Company, proposed to be the "Picture City", or Hollywood, of the east. When that all fell apart due to the 1928 hurricane and the stock market crash, Hobe Sound continued to thrive as a stop on Flagler's Railroad, the winter homes on Jupiter Island, and a community of service workers living in the Gomez and Banner Lake communities. But what tourists would be coming to Florida after the United States became involved in WW II?





Perhaps for a time there was not a great influx of visitors but indeed when the United States government established "Camp Murphy", a radar training camp, in the tropical camouflage of Jonathan Dickinson State Park bringing soldiers and sailors into town, and along with local ranchers, things picked up for the little business on the crossroads of a major highway and through road to the railroad depot, Jupiter Island, and the beautiful Hobe Sound Beach. Amazingly, as the next eleven years rolled by, seven different owners worked at keeping that prime-corner business going....until Jack and Pauline MacArthur purchased "The Farm" in 1952.

Each winter Jack's employment in Michigan on iron ore freighters on the Great Lakes was halted as the ships were put in dry dock and so Jack and Pauline would come to enjoy the much warmer weather in Florida. In February of 1952 in West Palm Beach, Pauline gave birth to their third daughter, and while his wife was in hospital, Jack, in order to entertain his older two daughters, took them for a ride in the car. He discovered a restaurant with cabins and gas pumps in Hobe Sound was for sale. Located on that prime corner the red buildings with barn and silo on the big sign made him think of their homes in Michigan and with his experience as a cook in the galley on the ships he decided he'd like to buy "The Farm." In addition, it was about time for daughter Paula to start school and so going back and forth every year would not be possible for them. It was a life-changing decision! On May 6, 1952, the MacArthur family arrived in Hobe Sound, lock, stock, and barrel to begin a new career.

Hey, Where You From?

Since the highlight of this issue's History Chapter is the iconic Hobe Sound establishment Harry and the Natives, I was reminded how often South Floridians ask each other where they are from. When I was growing up in a suburb of Pittsburgh, nobody really asked, because pretty much everyone was from the same suburb of Pittsburgh, and, perhaps thankfully, people from all over New England didn't flock there at any time of year, let alone during the winter. I've been here in South Florida for quite a while now, so I feel it's certainly my home, but it can sometimes be hard to find a true Florida native!

Much the same can be said of Florida's wildlife. Our State's climate has welcomed not only people, but all sorts of plants and animals that either hitch-hiked here from far away places among unsuspecting hosts, or simply managed to escape from captivity once they had arrived. Florida's ecosystems, however,

are not blank slates, and only some of the newcomers are able to gain a foothold. When they first arrive, each new species is confronted by species that are already established. These include endemic species, which are those that are found only within a certain locality and nowhere else, and native or indigenous species which occupy the space, but may also naturally occur elsewhere. Upon arrival, the new species are considered to be exotic or introduced. Only when these become established, spread, and interfere with the pre-existing ecosystem (sometimes to great detriment) are they considered to be invasive.

Today, dozens of introduced and invasive animal species mingle with even more species of introduced and invasive plants here in Florida. For most people, this vast array of aliens goes unnoticed. We get reminded of them, however, whenever we get stung by fire ants, try to protect our pets from the bufo cane toads, or get hit on the head by a falling iguana. Though you may not personally encounter them, some particularly charismatic invasives make the news like the Burmese pythons in the everglades or the lionfish on the reefs, while others like giant African land snails get less press but seriously threaten Florida's agricultural productivity. Though occasionally some try to claim otherwise, the West Indian manatee is in fact a native species to Florida while the coconut palm is not; and to many people's surprise, among the most damaging of all invasive species is the feral house cat, which kill millions of birds, small mammals, and reptiles each year.

Tremendous effort goes into combating invasive species, from massive government programs to eradicate damaging plants in the everglades to dive groups hosting lionfish 'derbys' off the coast. It is apparent, however, that many of these species have and will assimilate into the landscape so securely that they are here to stay. Looking back far enough, humans were at one time newcomers to this landscape as well, and look what we've done to it since then. Nonetheless, I'd like to thank Florida's natives for

being so welcoming to this Pennsylvanian 'exotic' upon my arrival over 30 years ago, and there's no better place to feel that way than at Harry's!



At first, they settled in an apartment above the garage on the property where the family lived until they built a house in 1972. During those years Paula relates, "the restaurant was our living room. It was where we did our homework, where we ate our meals. Mother would even put up her ironing board in the restaurant."

Paula states that her father, Jack, liked to tell stories and that she could write a book just with his many tales. He even had a different version of how they found "The Farm," telling folks that his car broke down in front of the place and so he stayed.

Things went well for a while and the MacArthur's welcomed two sons into their family, John in 1956, and Harry in 1958. When the Turnpike opened a new north/south travel corridor with no exit in Hobe Sound, traffic along U.S. 1 greatly diminished and struggling to keep the business going, Jack returned to his previous job spending summers sailing on the ore freighters. The cabins and cafe were always a family operation and the children helped with cleaning the cabins and pumping gas, as well as learning restaurant chores. In the mid 1960s Pauline began teaching Home Economics at Stuart Middle School.

Through the years, one by one, all of the MacArthur children moved away to pursue careers taking them all over the world. Young Harry MacArthur left Hobe Sound in 1976 famously stating, "I shall return." During those early years he trained as a chef working from Switzerland to Hawaii for Hyatt, Hilton, and Sheraton, and as chef at Ravel and the Sheraton Grande in Los Angeles.

Jack MacArthur passed away in 1986 in a hunting accident, prompting Harry in 1989 to come back to Hobe Sound. He remodeled the kitchen and opened the renamed restaurant as "Harry and the Natives" and clearly stated, "I have returned!"

As the years went by Pauline continued to be very active in the business greeting customers with her lovely smile, hibiscus flower tucked in her hair, and sometimes treating patrons and friends to a song or two as she visited tables. And she was often found at the cash register happily taking payment from the many satisfied diners. At the age of 99 1/2 when she passed away it was a great loss to the business, but also to the

community as evidenced by the huge turnout at her memorial from the community of friends and family. Harry's sister, Paula Cooper, continues in her mother's role helping where needed at the register or serving customers.

There are many anecdotes and legends surrounding this family and their business. If you've ever attended the Hobe Sound Christmas Parade, then you've seen Harry and his motorized, rolling easy chair. When his children were little ones, they would be sitting on his lap as he floated along the parade route. Now, it's pretty much just Harry in the chair since Piper, Wyatt, and Brock are much too big to sit on Dad's lap. By the way, between school semesters these youngsters are often seen helping in the restaurant – following in the family footsteps.

One of the stories associated with Harry as a three-year-old relates that Pauline gave him the job of delivering water to the tables. Apparently, Harry would fill the glasses, turn toward a table, stop, take a sip from each glass so he wouldn't spill, then serve the water. Some thought it was cute, but he was soon relegated to kitchen duty, waitering was not a good idea.

It is important to note another aspect that is little known. One evening as they sat together in the restaurant, Harold Jenkins told Harry, "You are the worst businessman in America because you give all your money away to charity. You need some help from people to sponsor some of your good deeds." And thus, in 1997 "Natives Helping Natives" was founded predicated on the premise that they would help local Hobe Sounders in need. One of their most important deeds is to shop for, wrap, and distribute gifts to children who might not otherwise receive anything during the holidays. In addition, depending on how much money is in the fund, they award 4 to 6 scholarships each year and they are renewable. Right at the moment they have 20 scholarships out. Giving back to the community is an important focus of this "Native!"

What image does the name Harry and the Natives conjure up when you first hear it? Is it the big Tiki roof over the large patio and bar area of the restaurant filled with the music of local musicians? Or perhaps the life-size statue of Marilyn Monroe with her skirt blowing; or possibly the larger than life-size gorilla sitting on the edge of the stage? Maybe it's the camel posing in the yard, or the outdoor BBQ grill made from the front end of an antique automobile? No doubt you have tried to read the hundreds of hysterical signs posted throughout the patio area.

Surely some think about the cozy interior original seating area made from native tidewater pecky cypress cut from Kitchen Creek that was milled locally in the early 1940s. And hopefully, it's the delicious meals served there from breakfasts, lunches and all the way to dinner.

- 1. There are five children of Jack and Pauline MacArthur: Paula, Linda, Sally, John and Harry.
- 2. When the MacArthur's bought "The Farm", U.S. Highway 1 was a 2-lane road.
- 3. Pauline was always actively learning something new. Before coming to Florida, she worked for The Farm Bureau in Michigan helping housewives learn to prepare healthy meals. She even taught classes in how to use a microwave oven (a very new concept at that time.)
- 4. Harry and his lovely Anne were married in 2001.
- 5. Paula MacArthur has published two books of photographs of Hobe Sound by collecting and cataloging mountains of pictures from numerous members of the community.
- 6. Many famous people have stopped at "Harry and the Natives." A few names include most of the well-known golfers, as well as Celine Dion, Burt Reynolds, Matt Lauer, and Sean Connery. It was the MacArthur's policy to not acknowledge the famous visitors but to let them enjoy their meal in peace. Apparently at one point when Sean Connery was there another customer went up to him and said, "You look like Sean Connery!" He simply replied, "Yeah, I get that a lot" and then he went back to eating his dinner.
- 7. Some of Harry's recipes have been published in Sunset Magazine.
- 8. In past years Harry's would close for the month of August and they would arrange travel accommodations for any members of the community who would like to join them on an adventure. They frequently enjoyed cruises with large numbers of Hobe Sounders.
- 9. Harry's was the location of this author's 50th wedding anniversary celebration with about 70 guests and this author's son & new wife held their wedding reception there with the famous local Jupiter Narrows Band! Through the years, countless people and organizations have held important meetings and celebrations at Harry and the Natives.

A Flip Floppin' Ocean sole Success Story

Kenya, Africa is the home of a business that cleans the local beaches, impacts over 1,000 Kenyans and creates amazing art—All from discarded flip flops that wind up as debris on the beaches and waterways of Kenya.

Founder of Ocean Sole, Julie Church, was inspired by seeing children making toys out of the discarded flip flops. She encouraged their mothers to collect, wash, and cut the discarded flip flops into colorful products to sell at local Kenyan markets. Thus began a social enterprise that pays bonuses to employees, invests in a welfare program that helps facilitate payments for educating their children, buying land, and other programs to support an impoverished community. In this process their actions make a difference to the plight of the oceans and gives back what they earn to change the lives of many through employment, education, and meals.

Ocean Sole provides steady income to low-income Kenyans while recycling a million flip flops a year. By using flip flops for their art instead of wood, they save over five hundred trees a year and contribute over 10-15% of their revenue to beach cleanups, vocational and educational programs as well as conservation efforts. They turn wasted, discarded, trashed flip flops into artistic sculptures while sending an important message about the state of the oceans.

In a country that has a 40% unemployment rate, Ocean Sole has created productive employment for men, women, youth, fishermen and other entrepreneurs. Some receive pay for picking up flip flops, and others for thoroughly washing and preparing the flip flops for the artists to hand carve into colorful sculptures for sale.

The sculptures range in size from key chain dimensions to small, medium, and large life-like creations. Each one is unique depending on the colors of the flip flops molded into the blocks to be carved and of course dependent on the distinctive talent of each particular artist. Most of the designs represent animals including, dogs, cats, penguins, elephants, fish, starfish, and dinosaurs, to name just a few.

You can find these amazing pieces of art at the Hobe Sound Beach Shop. They are collectible, make great gifts for children, and add special décor to any home. And, best of all, you are helping to clean the oceans and provide employment for many who truly benefit from the fruits of their labors through your purchases.

NOTE: Ocean Sole hosts weekly beach clean ups every Saturday. Last year they cleared 1 million pounds of ocean trash and this year with the help of "virtual volunteer" donations it is their hope to greatly increase that impact number. REFRESH GLASS was born in 2008 in Arizona in a one-car space in a garage. Ray DelMuro was a manufacturing engineer for an aerospace company for 5 years. He resigned to go on a trip around the world. His goal – to find a way to combine his passions for art, engineering, and helping the community.

DelMuro's resulting outcome was to repurpose and create functioning, useful, attractive, high-quality, engravable gift items from discarded wine bottles. He realized that folks are looking for "innovative solutions that solve their everyday challenges in a conscientious and stylish way that doesn't break the bank." And thus, began Refresh Glass or the "10 Million Bottle Rescue Mission." He sees his business as a "brick in a new foundation solving real world problems for the environment, community, employees and others."

Research showed Ray and his team that the amount we throw away and bury is enormous. Apparently, an average person throws away approximately 1,600 pounds of trash per year.

Americans generate enough waste each year to circle the earth 24 times. 75% of all that trash is easily recyclable, but only 30% actually gets recycled. It is estimated that "one rescued wine bottle saves enough energy to light a 100-watt light bulb for four hours, power a computer for 30 minutes, or a television for 20 minutes."

Refresh Glass diverts thousands of wine bottles from landfills every week helped by their local collection partners. This award-winning, Certified Green Business, has created from recycled wine bottles, some lovely glassware. Their products include drinking glasses, wine pitchers, innovative planters, and more. Items are beautiful plain or can be engraved with monograms, logos, names, endearing words, or other creative designs. They can be purchased individually, in boxed sets, or in large numbers.

The process for producing their fine product is done a few bottles at a time and with a lot of hard work. Though the bottles are washed in a bottle washer, the labels must be removed one at a time. It takes a lot of time and effort to collect, rinse, and "delabel" each bottle. When the bottles are cut to size, they melt the rims of the glassware up to a temperature of about 1,500 degrees F that glows and looks a vibrant orange color until, within a few seconds, it cools and results in a smooth rounded edge. The final process is a stress relieving oven bake, then they are washed and packed for delivery. They stock 7 different colors in the form of bottles and finished inventory to be shipped plain or engraved, and because wine bottles come in many shapes and sizes from height, diameter, and thickness, every mixed color 4-pack will always be unique.
