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Our History is a Treasure: Chapter Thirty-Seven By Jan Otten

HISTORY – we have a tendency to think of HISTORY as something that happened a long time ago. Something we learned about in our school years. But history is not just something that happened 12,000 years ago when the indigenous peoples first started settling in this peninsula. Nor was it just in the 1500s when the Europeans began exploring and naming it "La Florida." And it was not just in 1696 when Jonathan Dickinson's barkentine, The Reformation, shipwrecked on the shores where the Jobé tribe resided. It wasn't even just in the 1920s when the Olympia Company made an effort to create a "Picture City" to rival Hollywood. Nor was it just the 1930s and 1940s as families settled in, starting businesses and establishing this community - think about Parmelia Reed who was instrumental in creating our iconic Ficus Tree "Allee" on Bridge Road.

Yes, of course, all of this is history, but we need to realize that each and every day that we live here, we too are creating history. History is what happens every day leaving a legacy that brings a continuity of a community from its beginnings to its present and on into its future. There are the recognized family names like Pettway, Diamond, MacArthur, Algozzini, and many more, who through the years have made Hobe Sound the amazing community that it is. And then there are

more recent names and families who continue to create a pathway into the future.

That brings me to a little bit of Hobe Sound history that is more recent and is still a part of making this community a notable place and experience. We understand that it is the families who come here and become part of the fiber of this little town. A tapestry that endures and creates and contributes to its present day-to-day activities and will at some point be looked at as part of its past, its history.

For the purpose of this article, I'm going to talk about the families very much a part of Hobe Sound and the creation of the Hobe Sound Beach Shop and Hobe Sound Beach Shop Tooo... First, the Kleine family that morphed into Janet Kleine Otten and Barbara Kleine McLaughlin as well as their brother, George Kleine.

These three siblings were born and for the most part raised on Staten Island, New York. Jan graduated from Curtis High School on Staten Island and is an alumnus of Katharine Gibbs Secretarial School in Manhattan. The family moved to Huntington, New York where George and Barb graduated from Harborfields High School in Greenlawn. George did a short stint at Wagner College on Staten Island before joining the Navy, and Barb graduated Magna Cum Laude from SUNY in



Brockport, New York. From there the three siblings went in

different directions for many years. Jan married Rich Otten, her high school sweetheart and ballroom dance partner and together they raised four children. Rich's career gave them the opportunity to move around a bit, before settling in Florida in 1995. They lived in East Hampton, Long Island; St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands; and Montpelier, Vermont.

George's Navy years took him to the Philippines after which he shuffled from Virginia to California, to Vermont, New Hampshire, and then

Massachusetts.
Barb's very successful profession took her and her family from Rochester to Albany, New York and a few different locations in Massachusetts where her two daughters

grew up.

The three siblings were all very busy with their diverse careers and young families. When it came to retirement years, Jan and Rich chose Florida and leaning on their ballroom dance years started a DJ business entertaining at all manner of parties including many weddings. That led to becoming members of the Hobe Sound Chamber of Commerce and later Jan being employed there as the Director of Member Services. In the

meantime, George

decided to join the

Ottens in Florida and made the move south. Not to be left alone in the cold north, Barb and her husband, Barry McLaughlin soon followed. Once again living in the same location, birthdays and holidays became wonderful family occasions.

Now how did all of this lead to contributing to the history of Hobe Sound? Interestingly, George and Barb were attending a trade show

and saw a "press" that made creating custom tee shirts easy and they made the decision to buy one and try their hand at providing tee shirts for the many local businesses that needed them for their employees or, and very importantly, just one shirt if someone wanted a souvenir from Hobe Sound or a gift for someone. First try was to do it out of George's garage but just wasn't practical and they decided to rent a small, very small, space on Mars Street. It was so small it didn't have running water or a bathroom. For that purpose, they had to run across the street to the Taste Restaurant to use their facility (they kindly allowed them access.) They opened on March 17, 2018. Within a few short months it became evident that the little storefront known as Tees Please was much too small!!! As people inquired about various items they were looking for in our little town, and Barb and George would order new items for sale, they began to fill every inch of the available space. In the meantime, Barry McLaughlin came upon a much larger space available for rent on Bridge Road and they signed a lease. Much work was needed to bring the long-empty storefront to be appropriate for a pleasant shopping experience. Tile floors that were painted black were stripped and polished, walls were painted, slatwall and shelves were built, office space was created and finally staff was hired to help. And the shop's new location opened in early 2019.

The next big change came when an employee suggested a name change because in addition to the custom printing of tee shirts, ball caps, mugs and more, they now featured resort wear like Cabana Life and Tommy

Bahama as well as items for the beach such as towels. beach chairs and umbrellas, sunscreen, sunglasses and lots more. And the new name became The Hobe Sound Beach Shop. Soon after, Barb made the decision to buy the building that housed the Beach Shop and Island Beverage. She asked artist Nadia Serenyi to refresh the two original murals that Nadia had created on that building. On the

east-facing wall was the very first mural painted in Hobe Sound in 2009, and on the west-facing wall was the third mural. Barb then asked Nadia to paint a new mural on the front northfacing wall which by that time became mural number twenty-five.

A couple of things happened right at the beginning of Barb's opening of the Beach Shop and ownership of the building the county began a major project to revitalize Bridge Road and upgrade the aging underground systems so for eighteen months the road running right in front of the shop was dug up. In addition, closing on the purchase of the building occurred on a Friday evening and on Monday morning the nation went into lockdown mode due to COVID. But the little shop persevered. Like the Energizer Bunny, it kept on going. And through the years and transitions, Barb continued with her other job in the print and patient communications health care industry. Essentially carrying two full time careers all the while.

During those crucial months of lockdown, after fourteen years Jan's position with the Hobe Sound Chamber was eliminated and Barb asked her to join with her and with George at the Beach Shop – thus the Seaside Siblings team was complete. Jan brought a few ideas that Barb and George quickly adopted - creation of a newsletter

Beach Shop's Turtle Times and a

entitled The Hobe Sound

program to reward faithful customers by giving them a "Booty Coin" for every \$10 purchase. When twenty-five coins were accumulated the customer could turn them in and choose from a special set of four custom-printed mugs or six custom shot glasses. Each year a new design was used thus making their gift a "collectible." They were not for sale, only acquired with the Booty coins.

Along the way various employees came and left, but then arrived the dynamic team of Shareese and her husband TJ Grace who totally grasped the concept of what the shop is all about — they have become expert on the presses and Shareese has brought exceptional art skills with her and began creating new designs as well as fulfilling requests to recreate logos and even add photos to the various printable items available. Another long-time employee, on board from the early days on Bridge Road, Frankie Sanders, has continued to

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add a friendly face to greet customers and help them find

souvenirs, gifts or needed items for the beach. Yes, with the Seaside Siblings, the very talented staff, and the wide distribution of the very popular Turtle Times, the Shop has grown and prospered. Along the way, Jan enhanced each of the history chapters from the Turtle Times and a 30-chapter book was published and offered for sale - Our History is a Treasure, Hobe Sound, Florida, a Jewel on the Treasure Coast.

After seven years at the helm Barb made

the difficult decision to sell the building and find a partner for the Beach Shop. She was successful on both fronts. The building was sold in April, 2025 and by September a General Superintendent, Richard O'Connell, stepped in to help Barb.

Rich took the reins and grew the business from one mediumsize store on Bridge Road adding Hobe Sound Beach Shop Tooo... a second much larger location on the same thoroughfare, And now the O'Connell family has begun adding chapters to the history of Hobe

In addition to the original shop, the space on Bridge Road that was formerly Nautical Nice has been completely renovated on the interior by Rich

O'Connell with the help of his brother, Mark and a team of professional renovation specialists. The space has been painted, all new flooring installed, gorgeous chandeliers hung,

Hobe Sound Historical Society Holds Open House

The 15th of November was a special day for Hobe Sounders interested in the history of our amazing hometown. The Historical Society held an open house to introduce the original railway depot to the community.

It was exciting to see the many local residents and out of town guests who came to learn about this fascinating historical treasure.

The open house was presented by the Historical Society to introduce the depot and its importance to the community. The day was filled with information about the building as it now stands and what it will take moving into the future to make it a true representation of one of the iconic pieces of architecture that played a major part in the development of Hobe Sound and Jupiter Island. On a beautiful sunny day Society members conducted tours of

the building in its current state and explained what the plans are to bring it back to life. Ultimately it will be a small center for visitors to experience an important part of the development of this community.

Highlights of the day included presentations by two outstanding historians. "The Archaeology of Jupiter and Hobe Sound" by Robert S. Carr,

Also presenting was FEC
Railway Company Historian,
Professor Seth Bramson, "The
Florida East Coast Railway for
more than 125 Years,

America's Speedway to the Sunshine." Professor Bramson made it abundantly clear how

fortunate we are to still have this depot intact and returned to us. We must keep in mind that most of these depots, though similarly built to ours, were destroyed when passenger trains no longer ran along the east coast of Florida. Only a very few remain.

In addition, during the day, there was an opportunity to bid on extraordinary silent auction items donated by many very generous local businesses. Guests were able to sign up to become members of the Historical Society and to make donations to be part of the ongoing renovations to this local treasure.

Another important and very exciting event was also hosted by the Historical Society in the evening of the same day as darkness set in and the 1920's lamp posts along A1A were lit for the first time in over 100 years. Members gathered on the corner of A1A and Anstis Place as the lights began to flicker to life. A lot of time and work over several years went into making this occur. Studies were made by Society members on what type of globe to use, and how to retrofit all posts to make them appropriate for solar lights. Pat Martin of Diamond's Garage was very instrumental in the whole process and in placing all the special-made collars on the lamp posts and Bingman's Painting cleaned and helped protect each post with appropriate sealant. All of which was made possible by monetary donations from community members. At last this long-held dream came true as those 100-year-old unlit lamps came to life. Make sure to take an evening ride along A1A heading north from Bridge Road to see this very special illumination of our iconic "Picture City" lamp posts!!! (As a side note, each post

displays a plaque with the names of families or businesses who donated to help make each post light up.)

A brief background on the Hobe Sound Railway Depot:

Originally opened in 1894 to become a stop on Henry Flagler's railroad corridor along the east coast of Florida, this depot has had an interesting life cycle.

When first constructed it was located on the east side of the tracks a little north of where A-1 Auto is situated today. The depot was an important part in the life and development of Hobe Sound and Jupiter Island. Vacationers would ride the train to this little town, get off for a little stay, and often made a decision to come here to start businesses and to raise their families. Incoming mail would be tossed onto the platform in front of the depot and outgoing would be grabbed by a hook from an apparatus hanging over the tracks as the train passed through. During the heyday of pineapple plantations and carnation farms it was critical to moving the delicate cargo quickly to ports for transportation to further destinations. Very importantly, during WWII military soldiers were dropped off and picked up for assignment to Camp Murphy for radar

training. This little depot was a hub for social life as well as a stop for transportation along the east coast.

By 1967 when passenger trains no longer fulfilled their need the depot lay dormant. Interestingly, at one point someone actually tried to steal the building but was not successful. However, fortunately for us, it was moved to a place out on Bridge Road west of Federal Highway where Hobe Groves Ltd. used it for an office, later to become a sales showroom for a proposed polo community, and now finally, and gratefully it has been generously donated by the Becker Companies and the Discovery Land Company to the people of Hobe Sound. In cooperation with Martin County and the Hobe Sound Historical Society the building was moved to its new home on county property, now known as

"Railway Park" and renovations have begun to bring it back to its original appearance. This process will take a few more years and donations to help its progress are much appreciated.



slatwall for new merchandise mounted, and eight fitting rooms built in. Even creating a "mancave" space complete with TV for watching football.

Besides continuing to retain Shareese and TJ Grace and Frankie Sanders, Rich has brought onboard other members of his family to keep all things running smoothly. And has added several other specialists to the staff. Among them, Nina Pucillo, as Buyer; Jamie Smith, General Manager;

Maria Lopez, CPA; and Jan Otten will continue to write for and produce this publication, The Hobe Sound Beach Shop's Turtle Times.

- Pay attention to what is happening here and now examples, the renovations to the Apollo School, the Railway Depot, the lighting of the 1920s lamp posts along Dixie Highway. All history making connecting the past with the present!
- Take notice of the 100th celebrations of Martin County, the Apollo School, the Hobe Sound Community Presbyterian Church. Celebrations in 2025 that will be looked back upon as years go by.
- Things to think about: What did you see the last time you spent some time on the beach? What activities do you enjoy when you have leisure time? How do you celebrate holidays in the warm sunshine (instead of snow and shivering cold)? Do you go to the annual car show at the Pine School or participate in the chili cook off at the Hobe Sound Early Learning Center? What high-profile celebrity did you spot here? Do you go to the Christmas Parade on Bridge Road or the Singing Christmas Tree at the Bible College? Do you visit Jonathan Dickinson State Park or the Nature Center? Keep track, you're experiencing history, participating in life in Hobe Sound now that will forever be a part of its history!!

Hobe Sound Beach Shop Tooo...

A grand opening and two ribbon cuttings were hosted by the new Hobe Sound Beach Shop Tooo... to introduce to the community the second location of the Hobe Sound Beach Shop.

A grand opening was held on November 1st, followed on November 20th with a huge turnout, a ribbon cutting ceremony by the Hobe Sound Chamber of Commerce, and on November 24th another well-attended ribbon cutting by the Stuart/Martin County Chamber.

The original shop is still open and thriving at 9128 SE Bridge Road and now there is even more great opportunity to shop located at 9045 SE Bridge Road, the space formerly occupied by Nautical But Nice. (And a bit of trivia, if you've lived in Hobe Sound for a long time, you would have known that storefront as Chuckles, a place to purchase used books and furniture.)

Within a few short weeks the entire area was completely renovated — new paint, new flooring, slatwall added, 8 fitting rooms built and exquisite chandeliers hung!! Lots of art added for a great ambience and amazing inventory displayed and available for sale.

An interesting historical note regarding the building now housing Beach Shop Tooo... is that the buildings were once part of Camp Murphy, a radar training facility during World War II located in what is now Jonathan Dickinson State Park. Many of the Camp Murphy Buildings were salvaged and moved to new locations. Several were placed on Bridge Road including The Hair Company building, part of Diamond Garage, as well as the ones now housing Beach Shop Tooo... It has been reported to us that this building was once the Officers' Quarters and the Officers' Mess Hall, moved to this location soon after the war,

and then added onto in order to make the building that now stands at 9045 SE Bridge Road. In the beginning it was a furniture store operated by the Steele family.

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


