Our History is a Treasure: Chapter Forty-Three *By Jan Otten*

A HODGE PODGE of some interesting SNIPPETS!

A HODGEPODGE according to Merriam Webster refers to a *chaotic gathering of things that don't quite fit together*. Some synonyms might be: Mishmash (A confused or disordered mixture of things); Jumble (A disorganized or confused collection); Mélange (A varied mixture or assortment)

And what is a SNIPPET? It is a noun essentially meaning a small part, piece or thing, especially a brief quotable passage. Some synonyms would be: bit, speck, morsel or smidgen, scrap, patch, or even a sliver.

By way of explanation: when I do research for the chapters of "Our History is a Treasure", whether it's from personal interviews, or from the many books I've accumulated, or maybe even online through the numerous available and extremely helpful and informative online sources, I wind up with a lot of information that just doesn't fit into the particular chapter I'm working on. I save those tidbits and snippets and think it would be fun to create a "hodgepodge" of data for the *Turtle Times*.

With all that said, I am offering here some snippets I found really interesting and thought it would be worth sharing some of them with *Turtle Times* readers. A kind of "trivia" or perhaps "hodgepodge" of a mixture of topics all brought together. Some of what I've gathered are amazing, and eye-opening, and some are just plain fun!

Snippet #1

What is the nearby body of water that flows north and south, and notably in our area, is flanked by Hobe Sound on its western edge and Jupiter Island on its eastern edge? It is the INTRACOASTAL WATERWAY– NOT the INTERCOASTAL WATERWAY.

Because the two terms sound almost identical, "intercoastal" is routinely used as a mistaken name for the U.S. Intracoastal Waterway (ICW). The prefix inter is used to refer to something "between" two, or more than two, groups or places, for example, "international" refers to relationships between countries. Whereas intra is used to indicate that something is happening "within" the same group, system or place, or relationships that stay internal. For example, "intranet" refers to a network used within an organization.

To put it more simply: **Inter** is between different groups (across boundaries), while **Intra** is within one group (an internal activity).

Essentially the Intracoastal Waterway is a 3,000-mile (4,800 km) inland waterway along the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico coasts **within** the United States, running from Massachusetts southward along the Atlantic Seaboard and around the

southern tip of Florida, then following the Gulf Coast to Brownsville, Texas. Some sections of the waterway consist of natural inlets, saltwater rivers, bays, and sounds, while others are artificial canals. The ICW is maintained, improved, and extensively dredged where necessary by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to provide a navigable route along its length without many of the hazards of travel on the open seas thus providing a tide water **inland route (intra)**, secure from storms and enemies.

Snippet #2

While we're talking about waterways, let's learn a little bit about the **Gulf Stream!**

In *Turtle Times* Chapter Twenty-three Our History is a Treasure, we learned about the critical role the Gulf Stream played in the history and naming of the "Treasure Coast". In particular, the twelve-vessel armada known as the Spanish Fleet of 1715, was traveling north from Havana, Cuba back to Spain following along the Gulf Stream as the treasure-laden ships of that time did. They were loaded with extraordinary riches from the New World and were subsequently shipwrecked along the coast of La Florida in an unexpected and horrendous hurricane on **1**

July 31st of that year resulting in millions of gold and silver coins, gold bars, precious gems and many other valuables being deposited on the sea floor along the coast.

What exactly is the Gulf Stream and how much does the average person know about it? It is an important part of our environment and as mentioned, certainly a major part of our history, particularly on the east coast of Florida.

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), *"The Gulf Stream is a swift, warm ocean current that originates in the Gulf of Mexico, flows up the U.S. East Coast, and crosses the Atlantic toward Europe as the North Atlantic Current. It is crucial for global climate, transporting massive amounts of tropical heat that moderate winters in Western Europe."* ScienceDirect.com further describes the Gulf Stream as *"significantly influencing the climate of Northern Europe and impacting marine ecosystems by transporting plankton, which are essential to the food chain."*

Worthy of note, the Gulf Stream is one of the world's strongest currents flowing up to 5.6 miles per hour and moves nearly 4 billion cubic feet of water every second from Florida to Europe. At FAU's Southeast National Marine Renewable Energy Center, researchers are harnessing this powerful force of nature into energy solutions for Florida's coastal communities.

The current is swiftest near Florida and slows to roughly 1 mph (1.6km/h) as it widens and moves north. Moving north near the eastern coast of the United States, it carries a volume of water greater than all the world's rivers combined. It acts like a "conveyor belt." As the warm water moves north, it cools and evaporates, increasing its density. The heavy water sinks into the deep ocean and flows southward, forming a continuous global loop. Its impact on climate in coastal regions of the southeast U.S. remain humid, while places like the UK and Norway experience vastly milder winters than their northern latitudes would otherwise dictate.

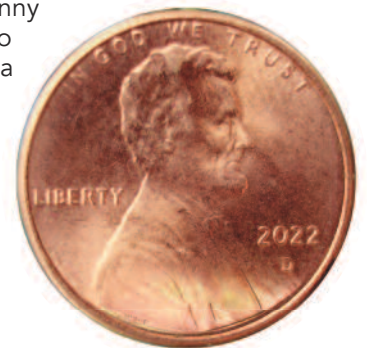


Snippet #3

Do you know when it is appropriate to use the word "fewer" or the word "less"? This is another pair of words, like intra and inter, that are often misused. There is a simple way to remember which word to use for which circumstance. Generally, the word "fewer" refers to items that are countable and "less" is for noncountable items. In other words, you can count how many cookies are in the jar, thus, "There are fewer cookies in the jar than there were yesterday." But you might have "less" milk in the glass. You can count the cookies, but you can't count the milk in the glass. Simply, if you can put a number in front of it, "ten cookies in the jar" you would use the word "fewer", but you wouldn't put a number in front of the amount of milk left in the glass so "less" applies. "Fewer" is countable while "less" is abstract.

Snippet #4

In a recent *Turtle Times* issue I did an article about the discontinuation of producing penny coins. And now it is interesting to note that the House has passed a bill by voice vote that is called "the Common Cents Act", setting national rules for rounding cash transactions to the nearest nickel and legally ending penny production in the U.S.



Confusing? But logical!

The last cent digit is: **1, 2, 6, or 7**

round **down** to the nearest nickel

The legislation also authorizes the Treasury to test a redesigned, lower-cost nickel made with zinc instead of the current copper-heavy alloy. Currently, every 5-cent nickel costs nearly 14 cents to produce, and the U.S. Mint lost roughly \$18 million on nickel production last year.

Snippet #5

Another item lately before the House and Senate could possibly indicate that we might be one step closer to no more turning the clock twice a year—no more falling back and no more springing ahead. This Florida-led legislation could possibly make Daylight Saving Time a permanent solution to this old controversial problem that has for the most part been in effect since World Wars I and II. Nineteen states have followed Florida's lead that began in 2018, with sponsors from both chambers of Congress and including the support of the President, with a vote of 308 to 117. Reportedly a strong bipartisan message was that "Americans are done with the twice-a-year clock shuffle that disrupts sleep, schedules, and our kids' routines for no good reason." Apparently, many would like to "lock the clock"!

All that being said, there is a strong opposition to the bill in the Senate who warn that a later sunrise would endanger children who could be forced to commute to school in the dark. Other opponents of the bill feel that the shift wouldn't just endanger school kids, but also workers such as construction crews, farmers, and factory hands, who would have to report to their jobs in the dark. One Senator reportedly said, "I can see where Florida likes it for tee times at certain times of the year, but it doesn't work so well for moms

and dads putting kids on buses when the sunrise in Western Montana wouldn't be 'till 9:30 in the morning." Another Senator indicated that, "Personally, I'm irritated every time I change my clock."

Someone rightfully said, "Total daylight hours on any given date are fixed by the Earth's axial tilt and its position in orbit, not by what the clock says. Around the winter solstice (Dec 21), places at mid-to-high latitudes just get fewer daylight hours, period — often 9 hours or less depending on latitude. No number of clock-shifting changes that number. What DST actually does is shift where those daylight hours fall relative to the clock." And someone else made a similar point, "I've just never understood it. Sunrise and sunset will happen regardless of what "time" it is. Changing the time doesn't change how many hours of sunlight there are." Some have stated that they go to work in the dark and come home in the dark and that they wouldn't mind having a little more light in the evening when at home.

And to add to the controversy, there's the faction that believes it should be set at Standard Time and not Daylight Saving Time! To address that part of the equation, it has been suggested that perhaps we just split the difference and set a permanent time to be 30 minutes between the two?? What say you?

As the controversy continues note that currently, Daylight Saving Time (DST) in the USA starts on the second Sunday in March (spring ahead) and returns to Standard Time (fall back) on the first Sunday in November. The current schedule was introduced in 2007 and follows the Energy Policy Act of 2005.

Though it sounds a little odd, Daylight Saving Time is the correct phrasing. Still, the variation Daylight Savings Time is so common, it's listed as an accepted variation in Merriam-Webster.

And who currently follows DST permanently? Arizona (except for the Navajo Nation), Hawaii, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin

Islands. Parts of Indiana didn't as well until it was adopted statewide in 2006. And in other parts of the world, only 70 countries actually observe it, according to CNN.

Snippet #6

I recently read about a study held in Australia regarding another controversial topic, the possibility of a four-day workweek. Apparently a 2023 experiment showed that a four-day workweek "created happier and more productive workplaces."

Researchers published the results of an Australian trial showing that a four-day workweek created happier and more productive workplaces. In the 2023 experiment, employees across a range of industries were asked to complete their normal workload in just eighty percent of the usual time. Only one company returned to a traditional five-day schedule, while six reported that workers became even more productive despite working fewer hours. All fifteen businesses said employee morale improved significantly without any decline in productivity.

Snippet #8

Way back in grammar school we learned that homophones are words that sound alike but have different meanings and are spelled differently. This has become a prevalent problem with the advent of emails and in particular composing documents on computers with our dependency on "spell check". Why? Because spell check most often won't catch these types of mistakes when the words are spelled correctly but they're being used in the wrong context.

One of the most common mix-ups that seems to pop up everywhere, is between "your" (a possessive adjective) and "you're" (a contraction of "you are"). Very often even experienced writers sometimes overlook this error.

Using the correct version of homophone pairs can make a big difference especially when it comes to professional correspondence. For instance, you might "happily accept" an invitation — you wouldn't "except" it. "Accept" means "to receive or agree to," while "except" means "excluding something," as in, "Everyone has responded to the invite except her sister."

Another commonly confused pair of homophones is "insure" ("to provide insurance coverage") and "ensure" ("to make sure, certain, or safe"). For instance, "We need to insure the package before shipping" means the writer needs to purchase insurance coverage for the package. Conversely, "ensure" has a wider scope: "Please ensure the attachment opens correctly" or "I want to ensure we're on the same page."

And of course, let's talk about what is probably the most often misused homophones of all – there, their, and they're. Sure enough, they all sound alike, but they mean different things and are spelled differently.

According to Merriam-Webster:

- **"there"** is a common English word used to show a place, point to something, or state that an item exists. Examples: Please put this over **there**. Or **There** are 3 cookies in the jar.
- **"their"** is a possessive word that shows ownership. It means something belongs to or relates to a specific group of people, animals, or things. It is also used as a singular, gender-neutral word when talking about a person whose

identity or sex is unknown. Examples: They just moved into **their** new home. Or The students finished **their** homework.

- **"They're"** is a short way of saying **"they are"**, the apostrophe takes the place of the missing letter a. Example: **They're** going shopping today.

How about this: **They're** in a hurry to get **there** to see **their** new grandbaby!

When you hurry through creating your emails do you take a look at these types of errors prior to hitting the send button?

Snippet #9

What is a Worm Gruntin' Festival? And where is it held?

Each spring, in Florida's panhandle, on the second Saturday in April, the small town of Sopchoppy in Wakulla County, south of Tallahassee, a Worm Gruntin' Festival is celebrated. It is a quirky tradition that grew out of the practice of what was once used to gather fishing bait and helped support local families back in the day. Worm Gruntin' has now become one of Florida's (and I'd venture to say the country's) most unusual annual festivals.



Thousands of visitors attend this free, one-day most unusual event to enjoy local food, craft vendors, live entertainment, including worm-grunting contests and a 5K run, all culminating in a "Grunter's Ball".

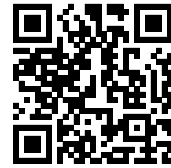
In the main attraction, participants drive a wooden stake, called a stob, into the ground and rub it with a metal rod to create vibrations that send earthworms scurrying to the surface. The friction of rubbing a flat piece of iron or steel on the stob creates a vibration in the soil that mimics the sound and feel of the earthworm's natural predators, digging moles. In response, the worms flee from the danger by rushing to the surface, where they are subsequently collected.

Apparently worm grunting became popular at the end of the 19th century, when the railroad moved through Sopchoppy. Railroad workers began buying and selling Sopchoppy worms, which are a native species known as *Diplocardia mississippiensis*.

What was once a way of life began to decline in the 1970s when plastic lures instead of live bait were being used by fishermen. And so social media to the rescue. According to an article in *Smithsonian Magazine*, April 2026, by Stephanie Castellano, some years ago Corey Benedict, a local musician with family roots going back several generations in Sopchoppy, posted videos of his family and friends worm grunting – apparently the videos went viral, with millions of views from all over the world. In 2026 the Worm Gruntin' Festival was in its 25th year where on the grounds of the Depot Museum folks gathered to watch the Worm Gruntin'.

There's a wonderful story in that *Smithsonian* article about Lossie Mae Rosier, who in 2003 at age 76 was crowned Sopchoppy's "Worm Queen." The article states that she raised 11 children on the money she earned from worm-grunting, going out into the forest at first light in the morning and again at dusk. Lossie Mae Rosier passed away in 2011. It is reported that amazingly, Lossie's oldest daughter paid her tuition for Florida A & M University with her earnings from worm grunting. A couple of other legendary families in Sopchoppy include the

Revell family and Sanders family with Worm Gruntin' stories of their own to tell.

Ah yes, and the Worm Grunter's Ball -- it is the lively evening finale of the festival. The ball features live music, dancing and local food and the crowning of the "Worm Gruntin' King". If you plan to attend: the daytime event takes place from 9am to about 6:30pm at Sopchoppy Depot Park, 34 Railroad Avenue, Sopchoppy, FL and the ball generally kicks off around 7pm at various local venues. It is recommended that before you go to check dates, lodging, and band lineups for the next scheduled festival, by visiting the Worm Gruntin' Festival Official Website, wormgruntinvestival.com, or the Wakulla Event Calendar.

I note that the next Worm Gruntin' Festival is scheduled to be held on April 10, 2027.

And now, after all of my research on the subject...I'm still left dangling with the question: How did someone ever figure out that the process, with a wooden stake and a metal rod, would bring worms to the surface? Do you have any thoughts on that?

Well, now you have it! A few of the snippets that I've found very interesting and have set aside to share. And this is only the tip of the iceberg!! I have tons more. The more I research a topic, the more I learn about the specific topic as well as other things that totally pique my interest and make me read more, search more, and wonder more. I'm thinking that maybe the next issue I will share some more interesting and fun facts with you. Watch for it.

Woof, friends! Shadow here, Hobe Sound Beach Shop's shop dog back at it again for *The Shadow Chronicles*.

Last time, I made the difficult decision to leave my legendary sock behind after discovering it had become part of a protected sea turtle nesting area. I figured it was the right thing to do, even if it meant saying goodbye to one of the finest socks ever to grace my collection.

A few weeks later, Sean and Liz took me on another sunset walk at Jupiter Island Beach. As we passed the same stretch of sand, something caught my eye. Tiny tracks. Hundreds of them. They looked like little tire marks leading from the dunes toward the ocean.

Then I saw them.

Sea turtle hatchlings.

There must have been dozens of them, each one no bigger than the palm of Sean's hand, determined to make the long journey to the water. I sat quietly beside Liz, watching them paddle their little flippers across the sand. For once, I didn't feel like chasing anything. No birds. No lizards. Not even the ghost of my missing sock. I just watched as every tiny turtle took its first big adventure.

As the last hatchling disappeared into the waves, I glanced over toward the old nest. My sock was gone.

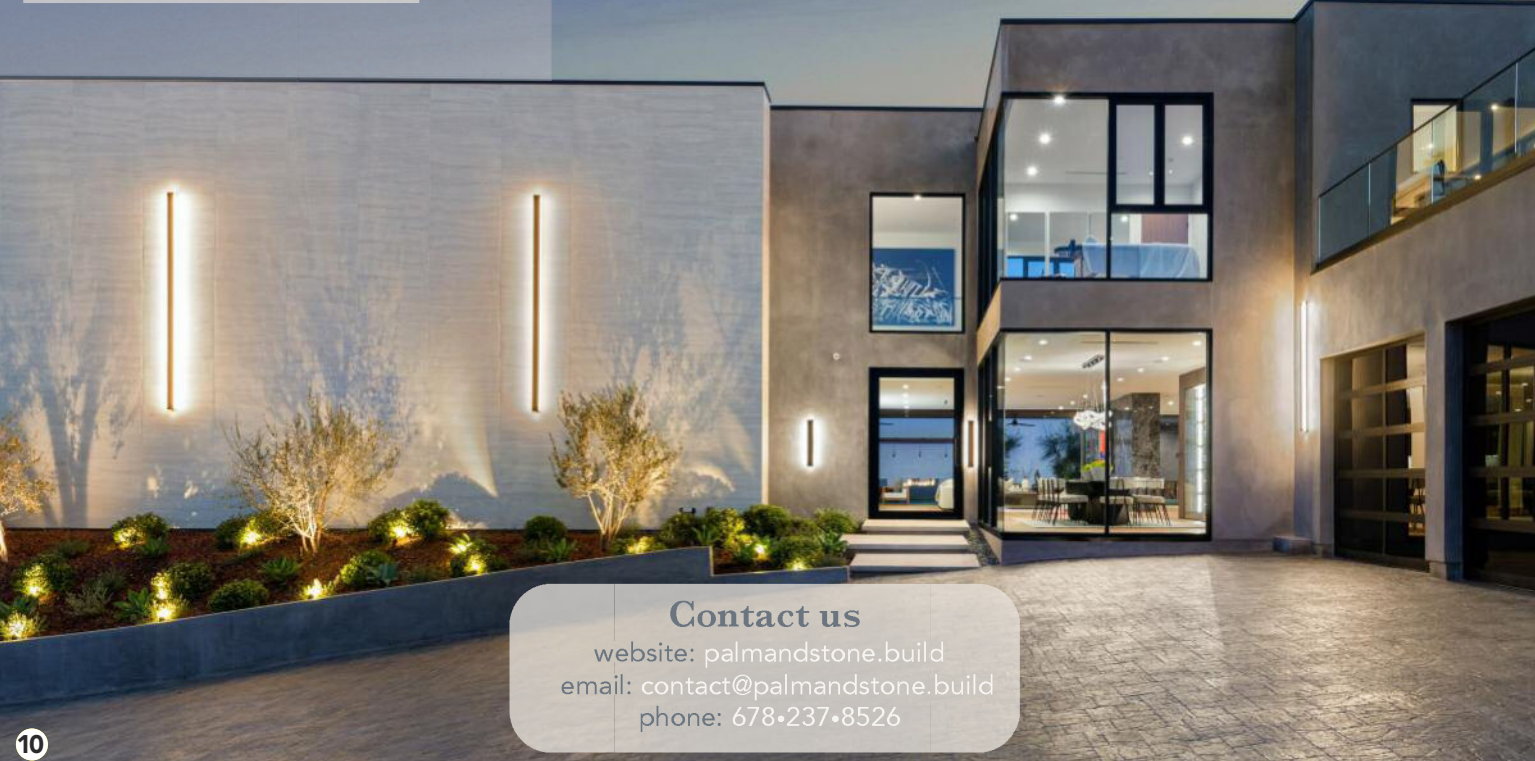

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Protecting Hatchlings

We're proud of Shadow and how considerate he is about not interfering with the turtle hatchlings as they make their way from their nests to their new homes in the ocean.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission has important hints on how to protect them as they begin life after hatching on our beaches. Not only are they endangered but they are protected by law. It is imperative we learn how to ensure their safety!

- Keep beaches dark after sundown—turn off lights. Use long wavelength amber LED lamps for lights that must stay lit and shield lights, so they are not visible from the beach; close shades/curtains.
- No flash photos on the beach at night, or use of bright cellphones or flashlights. The hatchlings can become disoriented and crawl away from the ocean.
- When leaving the beach, remove any obstacles—beach furniture, canopies, and toys. Left behind these can block the hatchlings from reaching the ocean. Fill in holes dug in the sand. Holes can trap turtles.
- Do not touch the hatchlings as they make their way to the ocean. Their struggle helps make them strong and remember the beach where they will return to make nests and lay their eggs.
